The American Fund for Emmanuel – Mission Statement

The primary activity of The American Fund for Emmanuel is to educate the public, primarily by soliciting financial support in the United States and elsewhere for the benefit of Emmanuel College, a part of the University of Cambridge in Cambridge, England.

Emmanuel College was founded by Sir Walter Mildmay in 1584 on the site of a former priory of the Dominican Order. The founder was for many years Chancellor of the Exchequer to Queen Elizabeth I. Of the first 100 university graduates who settled in the New England colonies in America no less than one third had attended Emmanuel College. Cambridge in Massachusetts was renamed out of compliment to one of the graduates and another, John Harvard, gave his name to Harvard University, the first in America.

Cambridge University is a collegiate university, that is, degrees are awarded by the University of Cambridge but students are admitted by each of the Colleges that comprise the University. It is the University together with the Colleges that organises lectures, seminars and practical classes. It is through Emmanuel and the other colleges that make up the University that students are admitted to a particular degree program, that each individual's program of study is arranged and individual teaching carried out.

Graduate students are admitted to carry out research in all subjects. The College also supports research by its professors and fellows in a variety of subjects.

In addition to its educational activities as a College, Emmanuel is housed in a range of historic buildings and grounds dating back to the 16th century. Almost all styles and periods to the present are represented in the variety of buildings that have been purpose built for the College and taken over by the College. The care of these historic buildings and grounds is part of the mission of the College.

The College has approximately 500 undergraduates and 150 graduate students from around the world. The College does not discriminate on the basis of sex, race, creed or national origin.

The College is supported by government funds, tuition fees and grants, research grants and endowment income.

The Fund's purpose is to support the College and its educational and charitable activities. Each grant will be for made only for purposes that are charitable under section 501(c)(3) of the Internal Revenue Code of 1986. If funds are requested, an application for a grant, detailing the proposed use of the funds will be submitted to The Fund. The Board of Directors of The Fund will consider the application, and, if it approves the grant, will enter into a written agreement as to the use of the funds. The grantee will report to The Fund on how the funds were used and will agree to refund any funds not used in accordance with the grant.
